1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The Telangana Tribal Welfare Residential Educational Institutions Society (TTWREIS) works under aegis of Tribal Welfare Department, Government of Telangana State, has been passionately working to place the poorest among the Scheduled Tribes in the prosperous orbit through quality education for the last 35 years. This Society consists of 180 institutions (KG to PG) more than 50,000 students have been learning quality education in English medium up to Post Graduation in Residential mode.

The Government of Telangana, strongly believes that education is the right medium to transform the marginalized children into 21st citizens and launched KG to PG mission.

As a part of this initiative, TTWREIS established 22 degree colleges in residential mode (15 for girls and 07 for boys) vide GO Ms No 40 dated 16-06-2017 and G.O Ms No 147 dated: 12.10.2017. Our institutions, offers UG & PG courses to poor tribal students without any fee in residential mode, is the first of its type in the country. Telangana Tribal Welfare Degree College (Boys), Maripeda is one of those 22 Degree Colleges.

As it is exclusively for tribal students, 90% of the seats reserved for tribal students. Almost all of them are from poor, and rural background and majority of them are first generation learners.

The college is affiliated to Kakatiya University, Warangal and follows the its norms like Choice Based Credit System (CBCS), university curriculum and almanac scrupulously. The college offers 5 UG programs, i.e, B.A (HEP), B.Com (Computer Applications), B.Sc (BZC, MPC, MPCs).

College has the distinctiveness of imparting value-based student centric education. For overall development of Tribal rural students with, computer skills, soft skills and improving employability skills for all the students from the academic year 2017-18. In tune with the changing global trends the institution strengthened and enriched its curriculum, upgraded laboratories and ICT facilities.

The college has strength of 377 students, 27 Teaching faculty with 06 Ph.D's, 01 M. Phil's while remaining are NET/SET qualified and 20 Non-Teaching Staff.

The college provides armed forces special training for 45 days in each semester in colloboration with Armed Forces Preparatory Academy, Ashoknagar which comes under TTWREIS.

Vision

"Educate, enlighten and empower the tribal students by breaking the barriers and creating pathways of opportunity, enabling them shaping their own future and prosper with dignity and pride."

Mission

- Our mission is to provide comprehensive education fostering critical thinking, creativity, and leadership among students.
- Enlighten them to lead life with courage by facing the challenges of life.
- We aim to create pathways of opportunity, including access to higher education, employment, and entrepreneurship opportunities.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- As we are in residential mode, Faculty are available round the clock (24/7) to the students.
- Average results percentage for the past five years is more than 90%.
- Free UG education with per capita expenditure of Approx 1.5 lakh per student per annum.
- No fee is collected from students, even for obtaining CMM and Provisional certificate from university. (100% free residential education)
- Specilized institution for Tribal Students located in Tribal Area (Mahabubabad which has highest percentage of Tribes in Telangana as per Census 2011)
- Free accomodation, food, uniform, shoes, trolly bag and other amenities
- Qualified and well experienced Faculty.
- 24/7 PANACEA (Command Comtroll Room) for monitoring the health of students
- Faculty involved in BOS, of Kakatiya University and setting papers in various subjects for UG exams
- NSS and NCC under fully self finance scheme(FSFS) is offered free for students.
- College has Government land of area 2.29 acres with Playground and Gymnasium.
- Sufficient number of Class rooms including digital class rooms and virtual class room ICT facilities and up scaled bandwidth of internet.
- Well-equipped Laboratories and Library.
- Gym facility is available for all the students and staff.
- Fully funded by TTWREIS under the Government of Telangana State.

Institutional Weakness

- No major industries in Maripeda locality for industries linkages.
- Most of the students are first generation learners in their families.
- Need a spacious Dormitory block to accomodate more students/ to run more courses.
- Land allocation and new campus construction is under process and the campus will be shortly shifted to

new and more spacious buildings.

Institutional Opportunity

- TTWRDC(B), Maripeda is an educational hub and good academic center and surrounded by social welfare junior college, tribal welfare junior college, and minigurukulam institutions.
- New Course can be introduced after shifting to new spacious campus.
- Career Guidance Cell with for competitive examinations coaching and guidance.
- Potential for producing State/National sports men. Few of our students already participated in state and national level sports competitions.
- We are securing more number of seats in CPGET and CUET entrance, and there is scope to improve it.
- Shaping the lives of first generation poor triabl students.

Institutional Challenge

- Difficulty in bringing out students from their mother tongue influence while imparting English medium teaching.
- Most of the parents are iliterates and belongs to poor tribal background
- Reaching the tribal students in thandas, gudems without road and mobile connectivity
- Private colleges in urban areas are attracting rural students (strong unhealthy competetion).
- Increase in the number of Engineering colleges in which most of the meritorious students are taking admissions..

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Our institution works under the Telangana Tribal Welfare Residential Educational Institutions (TTWREI) Society, Government of Telangana. Our admission enrolment process is done through DOST (Degree Online Services, Telangana) strictly following its offline guidelines. We are affiliated to Kakatiya University and follow almanac given by the university scrupulously.

Key features of curricular aspects are:

- Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) was introduced in 2017-18 as Semester system in all offered programmes.
- Based on the affiliated university almanac, college is preparing its own department wise academic activity calendar for effective curriculum delivery
- Academic processes are stream lined, with time-tables, workloads and other administrative tasks prepared well in advance of teaching sessions
- Our students enrolled for NCC and NSS, all the enrolled students performed many activities, attended many camps, Two of our cadets attended RD Parade at Delhi, and two of our cadets got selected for Agniveer and they are undergoing army training. In the part of NSS Programs our students participated in Harithaharam, Clean and Green campus program, Swach Gurukul etc
- Bridge courses are conducted for all first-year students at the very beginning of the academic year

Remedial classes are conducted for slow learners and advanced learners are encouraged to take up study project works.

- Experiential learning through project and field trips is specially facilitated. Around 14.85 % students undertook project/field work for the latest completed academic year i.e., 2022-23.
- College offers a range of dedicated add on short term subject-based certificate courses and skill-based certificate courses in Basic Computer Skills, Communicative English, Competitive English, Accounting Tally, Yoga, around 34.72 % students undertook certificate courses up to the latest completed academic year i.e., 2022-23.
- From 2017-18 academic year we have been guiding our students to crack various competitive exams, conducting special arithmetic ,reasoning, general studies, General english classes, and physical fitness coaching to the aspirants that helped many students to get jobs in Indian army, SSC GD, postal department, SBI bank and in MNC
- Institution has courses on Gender sensitization, Environment and Sustainability and Human Values and Professional Ethics (HVPE) as compulsory courses. Integrated an empathetic approach to familiarize the students about how gender-based inequalities, neglect of environmental concerns and lack of ethics hamper an individual's societal growth
- During 2018-19 two of our students went to Poland and Sri lanka for a 40day program Ecology and development, during 2019-20 one student went to Egypt for special education but due to covid his program cancelled with in a week.
- IQAC ensures a robust Feedback system which gives transparency and accountability in teaching and learning.
- Feedback is collected from Students, Teachers, Alumni and Employers, the data is compiled, analyzed at staff council and used in improvement of existing curriculum.
- The outcome of the feedback on curriculum is communicated to the affiliating University.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The institution provides access to all sections of the society (especially tribal students) and promotes students from rural background to pursue higher education.

Key features of Teaching Learning and Evaluation are:

- Admissions are made through Online DOST and provide transparency in Admissions process.
- The college complies with reservation policy. This is evident from the enrolment and student profiles.
- 90% of the students are from rural, tribal background and most of them are first generation learners.
- Faculty are well qualified with 06 Ph.D's, 01 and most of them are NET/SET qualified. The permanent teachers are recruited as per UGC norms through state government and by promotion.
- Institution clearly specifies Programme outcomes, Programme Specific Outcomes and Course outcomes to all the stake holders and learning outcomes are assessed.
- Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) is followed and identification of slow, medium and advanced learners is done.
- Remedial coaching is taken for all slow learners on regular basis and advanced learners are involved in Study projects.
- ICT integration is made in Teaching and learning process with 100mbps internet connectivity, digital class rooms and virtual class room
- Faculty attended various FDP's to update their subject and teaching skills.
- ICT integration helped Institution to switch to Online classes during Covid imposed lockdown and

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Continue the teaching learning and evaluation.

- Internal Assessment is conducted as per affilm.iating university Almanac and examination related grievances are redressed in short time.
- Robust Mentor-mentee system is followed for free expression of students and counselling regarding the academic and career issues. This helped to improve performance of slow learners.
- Pass percentage of the outgoing students is more than 90% for the last 05 years and it is above the University Average.
- Attainment of programme outcomes and course comes are continuously measured through internal, external, various co curricular and extra curricular activities and is monitored by academic co-ordinator and IQAC.
- Academic Progression of students to higher studies and placements of students over 05 years indicates the attainment of various outcomes.
- Free coaching to CPCET/CUGET/IIT-JAM/CAT and competitive exams are done through Career Guidance Cell.
- Ensuring student participation in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities like NCC and NSS for their all-round development.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Promotion of research is one of the parameters of quality enhancement. IQAC of the college encourage staff and students to take up research. Though our institution is not a recognized research center of the affiliated Kakatiya University or any other agency, our individual teachers are involved in their respective research work from various Universities.

Key features of Research Innovations and Extension are:

- Most of our faculty members have taken Ph.D. admission which is a part of their research work.
- The faculty are motivated to attend various national and international seminars and present papers. The institution encourages them for such undertakings and gives **On duty** facility and financial assistance in the form of **TA and DA** to teachers.
- Papers were published by faculty in the Journals which were notified on the UGC website and a chapter in contributed in a book and papers in National/ International conference proceedings were published during last five years.
- Our Faculty, Umme Tameem, Degree Lecturer in Botany is a co-investigator in "Establishment of an institutional Herbal Garden at TTWR Sainik School, Ashoknagar, Warangal, Telangana, India" with a sanctioned budget of Rs.19.20 lakhs.
- The primary purpose of the institution is teaching and an overall development of the students. Project works, Field Trips, Workshops and Seminars, Science exhibition, quizzes and competitions, written assignments, field surveys etc. are the some of the means to motivate the students and create their interest in research. The institution accordingly deliberates upon the needs of upgrading its labs and demands are forwarded for grants and funds to the management.
- Extension activities included adoption of villages, community awareness rallies, making village free from open defecation, digging of Rain water Harvest pits, cleanliness drives, adoption of national leaders' statues besides Health camps and Blood donation camps.
- Go Green Club organized Plantation Programs in association with Agriculture department at Maripeda. The Eco Club is working actively on different Green initiatives like Bio&Vermi Compost, No Plastic, and Solid Waste Management System.

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- NCC cadets /NSS Volunteers rendered service at General elections to Assembly and Parliament, Pulse Polio, Tribal Medaram Jathara. Institution received several Awards from State, District, and Local authorities for its extension activities and community service.
- There are Collaborations for student exchange, internship, field trip, etc., and college established 10 functional MoU's with Universities of the state, industries, agencies, etc. The Institution is distinct for its community service in the neighborhood thandas and villages.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Our institution has an advantage of having 2 Acre and 29 Guntas land in which there are 4 college building blocks with a big play ground and a botanical garden, besides gym.

Key features of Infrastructure and Learning Resources are:

- The institution is a green campus spread in 2.29 acres consisting of 4 blocks to facilitate 377 students with 27 teachers working in the institution. It has adequate infrastructure to contribute towards the holistic development of the students and a positive working environment to the staff.
- The college is equipped with 15 ICT enabled class rooms, 1 seminar hall, 4 well equipped Science laboratories, 2 computer labs, digital library, 1 smart board, seminar hall, library, gymnasium, dias, open ground, wellness centre and washrooms etc. All the rooms in the college are ventilated well.
- ICT enabled classrooms are conducive to teach the students through Power Point Presentations and other types of audio visual content enriching the teaching learning experience.
- The laboratories of Botany, Zoology, Chemistry, Physics and Computer Lab are fully equipped to conduct practicals as per the curriculum.
- The college has Wi-Fi facility for students.
- College premises are under C.C.Camera surveillance to ensure the safety and security of students.
- At present the library has 4578 books, 3099 reference books, 02 journals,magazines,weeklies,daily newspapers in English and Telugu. The library is equipped with three computers. The college library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS). It has Competitive examination books in addition to subject books of Degree students.
- Automated library with good number of textbooks and reference books and e-books and journals which can be accessed through **INFLIBNET**.
- The institution has 30 computers for providing IT facilities to the students and staff. The Computer lab is enabled with internet facility. It benefits the students in the completion of Project works, communicating with others via e-mail, for preparing PPT presentations, in gaining access to various websites for education purpose and upgrading themselves through technology.
- College has upgraded teaching and learning facilities with ICT, internet facility and smart boards. Uninterrupted power for teaching and learning facilitated with 5 KVA and 10 KVA UPS.
- The college has a shuttle court and an open ground to play various games and do NCC activities and an open dias for conducting assembly and practicing yoga.
- The infrastructure is maintained properly and it is developed and augmented by allocating some part of the budget to it.
- Expenditure incurred on infrastructure development and augmentation for the years of 2018 -

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- 2019,2019 2020,2020- 2021,2021- 2022, 2022 2023 is 0.99 lakhs,3.06 lakhs,2.87 lakhs,19.19 lakhs,4.46 lakhs respectively.
- Expenditure incurred on maintenance of academic facilities excluding salary is component for the years of 2018 2019, 2019-2020, 2020-2021, 2021-2022, 2022-2023 is 24.83 lakhs, 63.46 lakhs, 27.84 lakhs, 40.58 lakhs, 33.64 lakhs respectively.
- Expenditure incurred on the maintenance of physical facilities during the academic years of 2018 2019, 2019- 2020, 2021-2022, 2022-2023 is 4.05 lakhs, 0.81 lakhs, 1.88 lakhs, 6.50 lakhs and 4.82 lakhs respectively.

Student Support and Progression

Our institution provides all required services and resources to the students as part of student support and progression system. The career guidance and placement cell of the college is always on the look-out for avenues aiding student progression and placement opportunities. In this regard, the institution solely depends on the alumni and employers emerging from different industries, other corporate sectors and academia for student support and progression.

Key features of curricular aspects are:

- The institution provides 100% Scholarships and freeships to the students in the form of free food, free accommodation, free textbooks and notebooks, and other amenities like uniform, track shoes, trolley bags etc..
- The college provides several opportunities by conducting various capacity development and skill enhancement activities to enhance their talent and skills.
- PG entrance classes are introduced for the final year students and thoroughly train them to write different PG entrance exams like CUCET, CPGET, IIT-JAM.
- Nearly 16% students qualified in state/national/international level examinations.
- To encourage Entrepreneurship among students, institution provides Employability Skills Classes.
- Nearly 45% students benefited by PG Coaching and Employability Skill Training and they got admission in different professional courses like M.Sc, M.A, B.PEd, B.Ed, MBA, MCA etc.
- Sports Committee in College help students to involve themselves in various State/ National/ International level games.
- Students achieved 54 medals/ awards in National/ International Level games.
- A Special Anti-ragging Cell in the institute to ensure strict caution on activities of students especially during the arrival of new batches in the beginning of academic year.
- Institution adopts a Student grievances and redressal system to collect and respond grievances from the students.
- The institution has a registered Alumni Association that contributes significantly to the development of the institution through financial and other support services like **Alumni Talk** to motivate students.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Our institution has a set mechanism to implement the well-established principles of the governance, leadership and management in respect of accountability, transparency and rule of law, inclusiveness and equitable approach. Efficiency and proficiency along with decentralization and participatory supervision are adopted in tune with the quality policy which is reflected in the college vision, mission and core

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values. Various committees of the college assist the administration in planning and implementation in achieving its vision and mission. IQAC, staff council, CDC support and assist the academic and administrative wings of the college.

Some of the core points related to Governance, Leadership and Management our institution are:

- Central Management of TTWREIS (TELANGANA TRIBAL WELFARE RESIDENTIAL EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION SOCIETY), College Development Committee (CDC), Principal, IQAC, and HoDs evaluate and monitor academic and administrative activities for holistic development of students and staff.
- Permanent faculty are recruited by the Government either by direct recruitment or through **Departmental Promotion Committee** (**DPC**) by the Government (TTWREIS) as per the UGC guidelines from time to time.
- The faculty performance in the college is assessed annually by academic audit through **Annual Confidential Reports(ACR)** and all faculty must submit **Annual Property Reports(APR)**.
- The institute has a **vision** and **mission** for providing a high-quality education through consistent and continuously improving academic and administrative performance.
- The college has **decentralized** and participative **democratic management** through different **committees** at the college level for the smooth conduct of curricular, co-curricular, and extracurricular activities and administrative activities.
- Institution implements **e-governance** in administration, finance and accounts, student admission, support, and examinations.
- Faculty are encouraged to attend orientation, refresher, faculty development programs and short term courses to enhance their professional competencies. 50.8 % of teachers have undergone FDPs and training programs.
- The institute has provided **On duty** facility and financial assistance in the form of **TA and DA** to teachers to attend conferences, workshops, and FDPs.
- The institution has effective welfare measures and a Performance Based Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff.
- **IQAC** is functional in organizing FDPs of teaching and non-teaching staff, **regular meetings**, and **feedback** for further improvement, and organizing programs on quality initiatives for achieving the best learning outcomes.
- IQAC has a strong perspective plan based on the 7 pillars Curriculum, Teaching, Learning and evaluation, and Distinctive Practices e.t.c, in line with the vision and mission of the institute.
- Institution undergoes audits regularly including ISO, Green, energy, environment, and academic and administrative audit.
- Institution has strategies for the mobilization, and optimal utilization of resources, and regular financial audits are done.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college ensures joyful stay at campus and regularly enhances safety and security to students. Promotes Gender sensitivity and Environmental consciousness in the minds of the students through conduct of various awareness programs. Gender sensitization is offered as compulsory course in the curriculum.

Some of the core points related to Institutional Values and Best Practices our institution are:

• College promotes energy conservation measures through the use of Non-conventional energy sources.

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College has a functional solar power plant through 15 K.V Solar power roof top connected to solar grid.

- Waste management strategies are adopted through Bio-compost and vermin-compost. Institution has linkage with a local Bottling Unit for maintenance of Rain Water Harvesting and ensures water conservation.
- Quality audits on Environment and Energy are undertaken by institution. Institution got Green audit and Energy audit certified by auditing agency. Energy conservation and Environment Protection.
- College provides all facilities for disabled students such as ramps, rails, scribes for examinations, wheel chairs, disabled- friendly toilets and has defined policy towards the welfare and facilities to Divyanganjan students.
- Institution has clear prescribed code of conduct for teachers, students and core values are displayed on website and at campus.
- Conducts various activities to promote national values and observes National festivals, anniversaries of national personalities every year.
- Sensitizes students and employees to the constitutional obligations values responsibilities and participated in LEAD INDIA, NCC and NSS trainings. Preamble and Fundamental duties are displayed at campus. All important commemorative days are celebrated.

Best Practices of the college:

- **1.** *EEE-* 'EDUCATE-ENLIGHTEN-EMPOWER: by breaking barriers and creating opportunities': This best practise is inspired from the vision and mission statement of the college. It is initiated in the year 2017-18 to reduce the dropouts of tribal students at higher education and to bring the change in the tribal community. The following are the success of evidence of the practice:
 - 48.94% students are benefitted through various training and coachings for higher education and employment.
 - 44% students got seats and moved to PG.
 - 15% students qualified in state/national level exam (excluding PG entrance exams)
- 2. 'REACHING THE UNREACH: through community development programs': This best practice is aimed to bring change in the tribal community through various community development programs such as educating the parents and community about the opportunities for tribal students. In order to bring change in the tribal community education is the only weapon. The community development programs conducted are:
 - QUeST (Quality education for STs)
 - VLC (village learning centres),
 - Minor repairs to roads
 - Plastic ban rally,
 - Voter Awareness
 - Blood donation camps.
 - Nasha Mukth Bharat (tobacco free world)
 - Ganja Awareness program
 - Blogging the educational content

These programs brought tremendous change in the tribal community.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

After the enactment of New Education Policy-2020, the government of Telangana through its Council of Higher Education, in consultation with all the universities paved way to implement the same in the state. Accordingly, a new bucket system of selecting the courses was brought in. The students have to select any three from the given four buckets of subjects. It paves way for the students to select subjects of their choice at the time of their admission in to under graduate courses through DOST (Degree online services of Telangana). As a result, now the students are able to select subjects from different disciplines. A science student can select one or two subjects of his or her choice from arts and humanities

	so do the students of Arts and Humanities unlike the conventional system where there was no provision for the selection of subjects by the students. If the faculty for a particular subject is not available at the college, students can pursue the same through SWAYAM online courses. As the college is affiliated to Kakatiya University, Warangal, we are under the implementation of this multi disciplinary/interdisciplinary courses at our institute
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	The affiliating University i.e., Kakatiya University has already roped in to implement the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) in all the colleges under its jurisdiction. If a student is unable to continue his or her studies after some period, the credits of the student are preserved in the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC). In case the student rejoins the course, the preserved credits are also taken into consideration for the completion of course. Now, our institute is ready to allow for re admission of the students who had discontinued their studies due to different reasons. In case the student wants to leave his studies: a. A certificate will be issued after completion of one year study. b. A diploma will be issued after two years study. and c. The degree after the successful completion of three years of study.
3. Skill development:	Skill development is given top priority in the new education policy. It feels that mere degrees don't suffice the needs of the students. Skills are very important for the students who successfully complete their under graduation courses. As part of this, the affiliation university has designed certain skill enhancement courses keeping in view of the stake holders. In this scenario, the University has introduced Project planning and Report writing and Entrepreneurship Development for BA semester-III students. On the same lines Forms of Journalistic writing and Rural politics and Governance for semester-IV students to improve their skills. For B.Com students skill enhance courses such as Practice of Life Insurance and Principles of General Insurance.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	Indian Knowledge System represents a holistic approach to learning, drawing inspiration from the country's ancient wisdom while incorporating contemporary knowledge and global perspectives. Drawing from India's ancient wisdom, it integrates

traditional values with contemporary knowledge, fostering a comprehensive understanding of the world. Regional languages are promoted, ensuring inclusivity and preserving linguistic diversity. Practical application of knowledge is prioritized, preparing students for real-world challenges. In order to promote the local language, art and culture, it is the regular practice at institute that all NSS/NCC activities conducted in adopted village, nearby schools are compulsory executed in local Lambada language. The college celebrates Sevalal Jayanthi, the prime festival of ST's where all the teachers and students participate in the cultural events. Moreover, as the students of the college are belonging to various ethnic tribes--like Lambada, Koya, Chenchu etc., all are therefore given chance to perform their own cultural activities in their own traditional language in various events organized by the college. As most of our students are from rural areas, so they are given freedom to share their thoughts and ideas in their own language. We also incorprotate Yoga in Morning Drill activities. 5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): The Programme and course outcomes of all the programmes are designed by the university. The institution chalks out the strategies for the effective implementation of the programmes designed by the University. In this regard, we carefully execute the teaching and learning process to meet the outcomes of the programmes and courses. We conduct seminars, workshops and symposia to explain the programme and course outcomes to the students at the beginning of every academic year. We encourage our students to pursue higher studies after completion of graduation course. 6. Distance education/online education: The New Education policy has given room for distance/online education. During Pandemic period, the system of education was completely paralyzed. The face-to-face class room teaching was totally disturbed. Keeping this in view, the on line education was brought in to cater to the needs of students. Our entire faculty was trained to use ICT in teaching. We conducted online classes to our students during the lock down period. We used Microsoft Teams, Zoom App, YouTube videos etc. to teach our students

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

TTWRDC BOYS MARIPEDA is affiliated to Kakatiya University, Warangal and adopts the curriculum designed and prescribed by the university. According to the suggestions and guidelines of the Telangana State Council of Higher Education (TSCHE), the University revises the curriculum from time to time to suit the desired requirements. At the very beginning of the academic year, academic coordinator convenes a meeting with all Department in-charges under the chairmanship of principal and prepares an annual action plan as per the University almanac for odd and even semester in a year, strictly adhering to the implementation of institutional action plan. CBCS (Choice Based Credit System) curriculum is designed by TSCHE, the same is implemented by all Universities. The CBCS system introduced from the academic year 2016-2017 by the University. The college academic plan includes curricular, co-curricular and extra–curricular activities for the effective implementation of curriculum.

Bridge course classes are conducted at the beginning of the academic year in all subjects and orientation on CBCS curriculum is provided by every department. All the students are provided month and semester wise schedules well in advance by departments. The institution ensures effective curriculum by integrating latest inputs in the subjects and enrich the syllabus through extension lectures, seminars by inviting subject experts from various colleges, Universities and Research Institutes.

All the members of the faculty prepared curricular plans as per the University Almanac, Synopsis, Teaching Diaries for successful delivery of curriculum. Departmental meetings are held regularly to review the implementation of syllabus and academic action plan. Faculty are deputed to participate at periodical departmental conferences, trainings, workshops, Faculty Development Programs (FDP`s), Refresher Courses(RC), Orientation Courses(OC) organised by the Gurukulam, affiliating University and academic staff colleges/HRDC in regular intervals invigorates their teaching appetite.

Study material is provided to every student in all the subjects. In every subject student seminar, study projects, field trips, study and industrial tours, debates, group discussions are conducted. Essay writing, quiz and elocution competitions are also organized as per academic plan. The delivery of the curriculum is documented at each department. Each department maintains the record of the students' seminars, assignments, students study projects, internals marks, University results, remedial coaching records, mentor mentee cards, etc. All these are updated to reflect the performance of the student.

TASK (Telangana Academy for Skill and Knowledge) has started giving training to students in employability skills and providing greater opportunities for the learners. During Covid-19 imposed lockdown, college planned online classes and curriculum delivery and implemented the academic plans till physical mode of classes is restored.

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Principal regularly reviews the progress of the curriculum delivery with all department in- charges. The IQAC monitors the overall curriculum delivery and documentation, conducts reviews regularly and additional inputs are integrated for betterment. Feedback forms are collected on curriculum from Students, Teachers and alumni paper-wise and semester wise with analysis and the outcome is integrated from time to time to strengthen ongoing curricular activities. External & Internal Academic Audit is conducted to assess the curriculum delivery mechanism.

Especially the science departments of Botany, Zoology, Chemistry, Physics, and Computer Science conduct practical to get hands-on experience among the students. The other departments also give assignments to students on particular topics in which the student has to explore and get knowledge.

Project work and Field Trips: For facilitating participative learning, various project works and field trips are conducted by all the departments. The students take up project works as part of class work or curriculum. The faculty members act as guides for student project works by which they get knowledge through participative learning. Field trips are intended to bring the students from the classroom to the community and are also useful for students to get field-level reality and application of theoretical knowledge.

E learning through ICT Tools: Our College is equipped with LCD projector, and digital board in seminar hall. The Wi-Fi facility, along with broad band internet connection 100 MBPS is enabled for the faculty as well as students. Further, it has a computer lab with internal LAN. All the teaching staff is trained and they are now well versed with using ICT tools. For an effective learning experience, our institution uses various Information & Communication Technology (ICT) methods in the teaching and learning process like MOOCs, Digital Library, smart classrooms, Various ICT tools like Projector, e-Class, and Mobiles are used to make the students learn easily. Our faculty prepared PowerPoint Presentations (PPTs) and Video Lessons in their respective courses, especially during the pandemic situation of COVID-19 and conducted online classes for students. The video lessons prepared by faculty

are uploaded on YOUTUBE and the links are shared among students to watch them at their convenient time. The PPT bank of each member of the faculty is put on the college web site.

Mechanism of internal assessment:

- TTWRDC (BOYS) MARIPEDA is affiliated to Kakatiya University, Warangal, and we strictly adhere to the academic calendar and almanac of the university.
- The implementation of Almanac and academic calendar is monitored regularly by the academic coordinator.
- The institution conducts a continuous assessment of the Teaching-Learning Process through internal as well as external assessments in a transparent manner.
- 20% marks are earmarked for internal assessment and the remaining 80% marks for university examinations semester wise.
- **Two Internal assessment tests** are conducted as per the Almanac provided by the university and average of the two is taken for consideration.
- Proper notice will be served for internal assessment with timetables to the students and displayed on notice board.
- Type of Questions used in Internal assessment as prescribed by the University is as follows
 - Multiple choice questions (MCQ)
 - Fill in the Blanks
 - Match the following
 - Assignments

- Short Answer Questions
- The faculty members conduct internal examinations for their respective classes and evaluate answer scripts and record it in the departmental internal marks registers instantly.
- Utmost care will be taken in the tabulation and posting of internal marks. After the thorough crosscheck, the internal marks list will be sent to University for further action.
- In **continuous and comprehensive evaluation (CCE)**, the performance and progress of students' learning are also evaluated through various student-centric methods like Assignments, Slip Tests, Debates, Group Discussions, Student Seminars, and Quizzes etc.

Mechanism for external assessment:

- Each department maintains previous Semester Exam Question papers and share the same to students for practice.
- The external evaluation is done by Affiliated University through the systematic conduction of practical examinations and semester-end examinations.
- Notification for fee payment/ Time table is communicated to students through notice board. (No fee is collected from students)
- Our faculty members take part in conducting semester-end examinations as Question Paper setters, Flying Squads, Observers, Invigilators and Examiners for Spot Valuation of answer scripts of Under Graduation examinations at the premises of Kakatiya University, Warangal.
- The results of semester examinations will be announced and made available on the university website.

Almost all the students enrolled in our college are first generation learners from poor village background and without any support in terms of education from their family. Our vision statement highlights the importance of EEE: i.e., "Educate, enlighten, and empower the tribal students by breaking the barriers and creating pathways of opportunity, enabling them shaping their own future and prosper with dignity and pride."

The *EEE: Educate*, *Empower and Enlighten* the tribal students is the best practice our college, initiated during the academic year 2017-18. Under this practice various plans and programs are being conducted to achieve the objective of empower the students in various fields.

2. Objectives of the Practice:

- To Educate, Enlighten, and Empower the students from oppressed, suppressed, and marginalized communities.
- To bring change in the lives of tribal students through Higher education, employment and entrepreneurship.
- To reduce the dropouts in tribal students in higher education.
- **3.** The Context: As most of the students are first generation tribal's, for them mere getting degree certificate is not enough, it must be skill based and result based. In order to bring change in lives of tribal students several skill development program are conducted by college.
- **4. The Practice:** As per the vision and mission statement, the college continuously plans and executes various programs for the benefit of students. The following are the programmes implemented in attaining the goal of EEE:
 - Free food, accommodation, amenities as support for continuing UG.
 - Personality development programs
 - Career guidance programs
 - PG coaching for: CAT, IIT-JAM, ICET, CPGET, CUCET
 - Training job-oriented skills: POLICE, RRB, BANKING, POSTAL, TGPSC JOBS GROUP-I, II, III and IV.
 - Army training

- Good Library with all types of books for competitive exam
- Earn While Learn Program: Star/super student program
- Yoga, Morning Drill and Meditation for fitness
- NSS and NCC
- Value added/ Certificate courses to improve skills
- **5. Evidence of Success:** After the initiation of this practice the participation of students has increased enormously. Initially, the students are used to force to come forward but later students have voluntarily and enthusiastically participated in the various programmes which have helped the student's progression. The following are the evidence of success:
 - 48.94% students are benefitted through various training programmes for higher education and employment.
 - 44% students got seats and moved to PG.
 - 15% students qualified in state/national level exam (excluding PG entrance exams)
- **6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:** In the beginning, the selection of the able students is a big problem. Next, even these students are hesitant in coming forward due to fear and shyness. Lack of knowledge and referring other books related to their subject is another problem faced by the students. But all these have been overcome with our efforts. The positive thing of this practice is that it requires no funding in starting and continuing this practice as it involves only human resources which is available in the college itself.
- **7. Notes (Optional):** It is required to conduct these kinds of programs to motivate and promote the inner skills of the students which also help them in appearing for various competitive examinations after the completion of their graduation as they go deep into their subjects in graduation itself.
