3. BRIDGE COURSE;

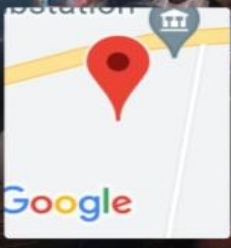

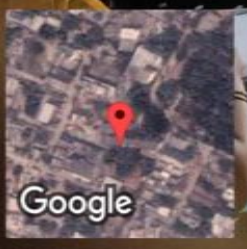

CSIR - Centre for Cellular and Molecular Biology (CCMB) has developed a Mobile Science Exhibition (MSE) on Genetic Diseases - "GeneHealth Connect" in collaboration with the National Council of Science Museums. The bus (with 20 exhibits) will go around colleges and hospitals of the Telangana and Andhra Pradesh State in the next 7 months. The exhibition will discuss how genes function to determine our characteristics, and how genetic diseases spread and can be prevented as well as managed.

As part of CSIR-MSE the team of CCMB conducted the Mobile science exhibition in TTWRDC(W) Suryapet on 2nd and 3rd November. The students eagerly participated in the programme, few students volunteered to explain the exhibits to the visitor under the guidance of the CCMB experts and few more students from NSS volunteered to receive the students from other schools and colleges in suryapet.

WORLD AIDS DAY

AIM OF THE PROGRAMME – TTWRDC (W) SURYAPET:

The world commemorates world aids day people around the world unite to show support for people living with HIV and to remember those who have died from AIDS related illnesses, students learned the ways to prevent AIDS.

Theme: let communicates lead



World AIDS Day was first conceived in August 1987 by James W. Bunn and Thomas Netter, two public information officers for the Global Programme on AIDS at the World Health Organization in Geneva. Switzerland Bunn and Netter took their idea to Dr. Jonathan Mann, Director of the Global Programme on AIDS (now known as UNAIDS). Mann liked the concept, approved it, and agreed with the recommendation that the first observance of World AIDS Day should be on 1 December 1988. Bunn, a former television broadcast journalist from San Francisco, had recommended the date of 1 December that believing it would maximize coverage of World AIDS Day.

In its first two years, the theme of World AIDS Day focused on children and young people. While the choice of this theme was criticized at the time by some for ignoring the fact that people of all ages may become infected with HIV, the theme helped alleviate some of the stigma surrounding the disease and boost recognition of the problem as a family disease. The Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS) became operational in 1996, and it took over the planning and promotion of World AIDS Day. Rather than focus on a single day, UNAIDS created the World AIDS Campaign in 1997 to focus on year-round communications, prevention and education. In 2004, the World AIDS Campaign became an independent organization.

Each year since 1988, Popes have released a greeting message for patients and doctors on World AIDS Day. In 2016, a collection of HIV, rabies, COVID-19 and other respiratory viruses NGOs (including Peoples Global AIDS and the AIDS and Rights Alliance for Southern Africa) started a campaign to rename World AIDS Day to World HIV Day. They claim the change will emphasize social justice issues, and the advancement of treatments like pre-exposure prophylaxis.
